**Edward R. Mariano, MD, MAS** is a Professor of Anesthesiology, Perioperative and Pain Medicine Stanford University School of Medicine and Chief of the Anesthesiology and Perioperative Care Service at the Veterans Affairs Palo Alto Health Care System. His research interests include the development of techniques and patient care pathways to improve outcomes including postoperative pain control and developing guidelines, standards, quality and cost measures in perioperative care. His focus on regional anesthesia and pain management includes key participation in the National Academy of Medicine Action Collaborative Countering the U.S. Opioid Epidemic and serving as Director of the Stanford Regional Anesthesiology and Acute Pain Medicine Fellowship Program from 2016-2022. Dr. Mariano is the current president of the California Society of Anesthesiologists and is a recipient of the Veterans Health Administration's John D. Chase Award for Physician Executives Excellence.



**Elizabeth Wick, M.D.** is one of the principal investigators for ISCR. She is a colorectal surgeon with specific interests in minimally invasive or laparoscopic surgery, sphincter-preserving procedures for rectal cancer, and inflammatory bowel diseases. Dr. Wick is a recognized national leader in perioperative research with over 75 published articles. She has been instrumental in the vision of the ISCR effort-- spreading best practices nationally and across surgical specialties. Dr. Wick received her medical degree at Vanderbilt University, her Internship and Residency at UCSF, fellowship at the Cleveland Clinic, and was faculty at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine before joining the faculty at UCSF in 2016. She continues as faculty with the Johns Hopkins Armstrong Institute for Patient Safety and Quality.



**Julius Pham, M.D.Ph.D.** is a practicing critical care and ED physician, educator, and patient safety researcher. He bridges the work of the Johns Hopkins Armstrong Institute for Patient Safety and Quality and Hawaii with joint faculty appointments with both the Armstrong Institute and John A. Burns School of Medicine. He is also the Patient Safety Officer for the Queen's Health System.
